May 19th marked the beginning of the Construction Basics CORE- Cohort 2 in conjunction with NRPC/MHCDO's joint project at 301 Florida Avenue, NE in the District. Twenty-one participants will work toward certifications in Construction, OSHA 10, Fall Prevention and CPR/First Aid during their80-hour program over five weeks subsidized by the developers.

On May 29th, an exclusive Construction Hiring Fair was held at MHCDO's main office at 3939 Benning Road, NE with over 18 NRP subcontractors committed to hiring trained District residents. Cohort participants prepared for the event by updating their resumes and preparing brief introductory statements about their skills and talents pertaining to employment. Sixteen participants set goals of meeting with representatives from three companies hiring in areas of interest to each applicant. Fallowing the program, subcontractors will contact individuals to schedule interviews or complete online applications for further evaluation.

The Workforce Development unit closes out the month of May with its last quarter blitz to update resumes and identify job opportunities for individuals who have taken classes during the last year including Job Readiness Programs, Construction Certificate Training & Food and Customer Service Programs.

April – Financial Literacy Month & May – Small Business Month


MHCDO's Small Business Development

Pioneering educator, orator, religious leader, and civil rights activist Nannie Helen Burroughs was born in Virginia to formerly enslaved parents. Burroughs dedicated her life to advancing education and empowerment for Black women. In 1909, she founded the National Training School for Women and Girls in Washington, D.C., a groundbreaking institution that provided vocational and academic training at a time when few opportunities existed for African American women. Burroughs believed in the importance of self-reliance, moral integrity, and professional development, and her school reflected these values, preparing women not just for work, but for leadership in their communities.

Burroughs would have been 146 years old this year. On Saturday May 10, 2025, Advisory Neighborhood Commission (ANC) 7C sponsored a Community Resource event in her honor at Marvin Gaye Park. The event featured food, music, information on city services and family-friendly activities.

Safety & Beautification Progress on Pennsylvania Avenue SE

MHCDO is making progress on the Safe Commercial Corridors Grant for the Lower Node of Pennsylvania Avenue SE, supported by the Office of the Deputy Mayor for Public Safety and Justice. Through this grant, we are working with property owners, business owners, District agencies, and community partners to enhance safety and beautification efforts along the corridor. Key activities include façade improvements, lighting and security camera installations, and the development of a public art mural. In the coming months, residents can expect to see physical improvements begin, pop-up placemaking events alleyways, and continued collaboration to make the corridor safer, more welcoming, and vibrant.

Community Voices Shape the Future of Ward 7 Mobility

On May 28th, MHCDO and the Washington Area Bicyclist Association (WABA) hosted a Community Listening Session where residents of all ages shared their lived experiences navigating Ward 7 and utilizing its green spaces. Neighbors voiced concerns about safety and cleanliness, with one resident noting, "It's not just about maintenance — it's a mindset. We need to change how we care for these spaces." Residents called for welcoming, accessible transportation and mobility options, including better lighting and more direct routes through Ward 7 and across the river. They envisioned a trail that connects communities, supports mental health, and a space for multigenerational activities like walking, picnicking, and even fish fries. MHCDO and WABA are grateful for the thoughtful feedback and remain committed to amplifying these voices in ongoing advocacy and planning efforts.
